Subject: **Proposed District Consolidation** 

> The Commission will consider a proposal submitted by resolutions of application by the Board of Trustees of the Pine Grove and Fall River Mills Cemetery Districts for a consolidated Pine Grove Cemetery District. Commission action would also include the dissolution of the Fall River Mills Cemetery District, the adoption of a Sphere of Influence for the consolidated district and waive protest proceeding if no

protests received.

LAFCOs are responsible under the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 to regulate the formation and development of local governmental agencies and their municipal services. This includes approving or disapproving proposed changes of organization, such as boundary changes, consistent with adopted policies and procedures pursuant to California Government Code (G.C.) § 56375. LAFCOs are authorized with broad discretion in amending and conditioning changes of organization as long as they do not directly regulate land use, property development, or subdivision requirements.


## **BACKGROUND**

Proceedings for this consolidation were initiated by resolutions of application by the Board of Trustees of the Pine Grove and Pine Grove Fall River Mills Cemetery Districts. The proposal includes consolidation of approximately 113,393 acres of resource lands with several small unincorporated communities, generally located in northwestern Shasta County, and accessed via Hwy 299 and Hwy 89. (see Exhibit A). Existing land uses are agricultural with areas of open space dispersed along the edges. Several small communities are located along Hwy 299. Public notice of the proposed consolidation was provided through a legal notice published in the Mountain Echo newspaper on May 9, 2017, with a subsequent notice published in the Record Searchlight newspaper.

## **Reasons for Proposal**

The reasons for the consolidation as set forth in the proposal to LAFCO are as follows:

The Fall River Mills Cemetery District cannot fiscally continue operating their sites with the revenue they receive. This has been an issue for many years but it has become acute the past few years. Both districts rely on property tax revenue with burial service fees providing a very small amount of revenue. Pine Grove Cemetery District receives substantially more tax revenue so it makes fiscal sense to consolidate like districts into one district. It is a cost saving solution while maintaining the same level of service with minimal disruption to all concerned. The boundary of the consolidated district would be the same as the two existing district boundaries, and the Sphere of Influence (SOI) would be the same as the consolidated district boundary (Exhibit A – Consolidated District Boundary and SOI)



## **Provision of Public Services**

A Plan for Services has been prepared by the Cemetery Districts for the proposed consolidated district. As contemplated, the consolidated Pine Grove Cemetery District would be responsible for providing burial services and memorial garden maintenance to the Pine Grove, and Fall River Mills Cemeteries, and garden

maintenance to Winters Cemetery, upon consolidation. There would be no change in cemetery services provided by the Pine Grove Cemetery District beyond what is currently provided by the two districts.

## **Land Use Designations**

Land uses within the proposed consolidated district are subject to the Shasta County General Plan and Zoning Regulations. Existing land uses are primarily agriculture with areas of open space dispersed along the edges. There is one irrigation reservoir that provides water to several small communities located along Hwy 299, the main transportation artery to the district. The current land use designations in the district are primarily a mix of Agricultural, Open Space, Commercial, Industrial, Limited Residential and Rural Residential.

## **ANALYSIS**

The analysis of the proposal is organized into two sections. The first section considers the proposal relative to the factors mandated for review by the Legislature anytime LAFCOs review boundary changes. The second section considers issues required by other applicable State statutes in processing boundary changes, such as environmental compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act.

## Required Factors for Review

G.C.§ 56668 requires the Commission to consider 16 specific factors anytime it reviews proposals for a change of organization. No single factor is determinative. The purpose in considering these factors is to help inform the Commission in its decision-making process. An evaluation of these factors as it relates to the proposal follows.

1) Population and population density; land area and land use; per capita assessed valuation; topography, natural boundaries, and drainage basins; proximity to other populated areas; the likelihood of significant growth in the area, and in adjacent incorporated and unincorporated areas, during the next 10 years.

The consolidated district area, as proposed is approximately 255,466 acres. The current population of the consolidated district is approximately 2,474 residents based on (2010 Census). The entire consolidated district may accommodate a population of approximately 2,802 by the year 2035.

2) The need for organized community services; the present cost and adequacy of governmental services and controls in the area; probable future needs for those services and controls; probable effect of the proposed incorporation, formation, annexation, or exclusion and of alternative courses of action on the cost and adequacy of services and controls in the area and adjacent areas.

Pursuant to Government Code § 56653, the Plan for Services to evaluate the needs of the proposed consolidated district. The need for expanded community services within the affected territory includes cemetery services only. An analysis of the availability and adequacy of these services relative to projected needs of the proposal follows.

## Cemetery Services

Interment services and memorial garden maintenance will be provided by the Pine Grove Cemetery District and follow the Pine Grove Cemetery District's policies and protocols.

## Fire Protection

The proposed consolidated district receives fire protection and emergency response services from County Service Area #1 – Shasta County Fire Department (SCFD), the McArthur Fire Protection District, and the Fall River Mills Fire Protection District

## Law Enforcement

The proposed consolidated district is currently served by the Shasta County Sheriff's Office. Increase in demand for law enforcement is not expected due to consolidation.

## Road Maintenance

No additional requirements for road maintenance are anticipated as a result of the consolidation.

3) The effect of the proposed action and of alternative actions, on adjacent areas, on mutual social and economic interests, and on the local governmental structure of the county.

The consolidation as proposed would consolidate two districts, totally 255,466 acres of primarily agricultural and open space land uses. This area is within the Fall River Valley Community Services District and is analyzed in the Pine Grove Cemetery District MSR SOI update. No change to mutual social and economic interests, or county governmental structure are anticipated.

4) The conformity of the proposal and its anticipated effects with both the adopted commission policies on providing planned, orderly, efficient patterns of urban development, and the policies and priorities set forth in G.C. Section 56377.

The statutory goals of the LAFCO include the promotion of orderly growth and development by determining logical local boundaries [§56001], the preservation of open space by encouraging development of vacant land within cities before annexation of vacant land adjacent to cities [§56377(b)], and the preservation of prime agricultural land by guiding development away from presently undeveloped prime agricultural lands [§56377(a)]. The proposed uses that would be accommodated in the consolidated district comply with the statutory goals discussed above.

5) The effect of the proposal on maintaining the physical and economic integrity of agricultural lands, as defined by G.C. Section 56016.

Due to the primarily agricultural nature of the district, it is expected that some of the territory is subject to Williamson Act Contracts. The consolidation is not expected to have an adverse impact on the agricultural lands in the district.

6) The definiteness and certainty of the boundaries of the territory, the nonconformance of proposed boundaries with lines of assessment or ownership, the creation of islands or corridors of unincorporated territory, and other similar matters affecting the proposed boundaries.

A map and geographic description meeting applicable State Board of Equalization requirements will be required prior to filing a certificate of completion for the consolidation. The proposed consolidated district boundary follows existing district boundaries. Also, the proposed consolidated district would not create islands or corridors of unincorporated territory.

## 7) A regional transportation plan adopted pursuant to G.C. Section 65080.

The Shasta County Regional Transportation Plan was last updated in 2015 and is a long-range transportation planning document for Shasta County. The RTP identifies several minor projects involving the affected territory. These projects are not expected to take place until 2026 or later.

8) Consistency with city or county general and specific plans.

Land uses within the proposed consolidated district are currently designated as a mix of agricultural, open space, commercial, industrial and rural residential. The consolidation does not require zoning amendments and land use is expected to remain consistent with county and specific plans.

9) The sphere of influence of any local agency which may be applicable to the proposal being reviewed.

The proposed consolidation district is located within the Fall River Valley CSD Sphere of Influence (SOI).

10) The comments of any affected local agency or other public agency.

The Cemetery Districts provided sufficient notice to interested and subject agencies of its intent to adopt a resolution of application, pursuant to GC Section 56654(c). LAFCO staff also provided notice of the proposed consolidation through a legal notice published in the Mountain Echo newspaper on May 9, 2017.

11) The ability of the newly formed or receiving entity to provide the services which are the subject of the application to the area, including the sufficiency of revenues for those services following the proposed boundary change.

Both the Pine Grove and Fall River Mills Cemetery Districts rely on property tax revenue with burial service fees providing a very small amount of revenue. The Fall River Cemetery District cannot fiscally continue operating their sites with the revenue they receive. Pine Grove Cemetery District receives substantially more tax revenue so it makes fiscal sense from the county's perspective to consolidate like districts into one district.

12) Timely availability of water supplies adequate for projected needs as specified in G.C. § 65352.5.

No water supply capacity limitations have been identified and the need to increase system capacity as a result of the proposed consolidation is not anticipated.

The extent to which the proposal will affect a city or cities and the county in achieving their respective fair shares of the regional housing needs as determined by the appropriate council of governments consistent with Article 10.6 (commencing with § 65580) of Chapter 3 of Division 1 of Title 7.

The proposal would not impact any local agencies in accommodating their regional housing needs. The affected territory is currently developed with single family residential and agricultural uses. There are currently no residential development plans for the proposed consolidated district area.

14) Any information or comments from the landowner or owners, voters, or residents of the affected territory.

Property owners were notified regarding the consolidation proposal and no comments received.

15) Any information relating to existing land use designations.

See discussion in section 8.

16) The extent to which the proposal will promote environmental justice. As used in this subdivision, "environmental justice" means the fair treatment of people of all races, cultures, and incomes with respect to the local of public facilities and the provision of public services.

The proposal will not result in inconsistencies with environmental justice safeguards. The consolidated district will result in expanded public services for residents. The residents within the two districts they now have a choice of where to be buried without incurring non-resident burial fees.

## Other Considerations

## Environmental Review

LAFCO has responsibility to comply with the environmental review process per CEQA Guidelines found in Public Resources Code Section 210000 et seq The purpose of the environmental review process is to provide information about the environmental effects of the actions and decisions. It has been determined that this project is statutorily exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 15262 — Feasibilities & Planning Studies and categorically exempt pursuant to Section 15306 — Information Collection. The consolidation is an administrative activity that will not bring about any physical changes to the environment. The proposed consolidation does not involve, authorize or permit the siting or construction of any facilities. A Notice of Exemption has been prepared.

## Master Property Tax Agreement

The property tax allocations to the consolidated district will be the same as for the two districts, as shown in the attached Shasta County Auditors Tax Revenue Table.

## Conducting Authority Proceedings

All proposed boundary changes approved by the Commission are subject to conducting authority proceedings (i.e., protest hearing) <u>unless waived in accordance with criteria outlined under G.C. Section 56663</u>. The proposal is not subject to conducting authority proceedings under G.C. Section 56663 unless written opposition is received from landowners or registered voters within the affected territory prior to the conclusion of the Commission's proceedings on the proposal.

## B. RECOMMENDATION

## APPROVE SUBJECT TO CONDITIONS:

It is recommended the following conditions of approval be applied, with delegation to the Executive Officer to determine when sufficiently satisfied, before proceeding with recordation.

- Completion of the 30-day reconsideration period provided under G.C. § 56895.
- Submittal of a final map and geographic description of the affected territory conforming to applicable State Board of Equalization requirements.
- Payment of any outstanding fees as identified in the Commission's adopted fee schedule.

## Attachment 2 - Plan For Service

## Introduction

The intent of the Plan for Service (Government Code § 56653) is to describe how a proposed consolidation will be implemented if approved. The service provider for the consolidated district must document their ability to provide services, taking into account the services, capacity, cost and services adequacy and how those services would be affected by the proposed LAFCO action. A Plan for Service, accepted by the Executive Officer, is required for the application to be deemed complete.

A service district may provide a Facility Improvement Letter, or other written documentation verifying the ability to provide service. While this information can be useful it can only be considered as a supplement to the Plan for Service. Additional information may need to be obtained from the service provider in order to complete a Plan for Service.

## **Objective**

The Plan for Service describes and explains the consolidated services, how and when the services will be needed and provided, how much the services will cost and how those costs will be paid. In addition, the Plan for Service demonstrates the anticipated benefits of consolidated service. The Plan for Service is reviewed by LAFCO staff, and additional information or clarification may be needed. The Plan for Service becomes a key part of the staff report and recommendation.

## **Cemetery Profiles**

## Pine Grove Cemetery District -

Formation of Pine Grove Cemetery District was approximately 1886 with formal recognition by Shasta County Board of Supervisors in 1925. Pine Grove Cemetery is located at 44631 Hwy299 East in McArthur, CA and has a 5 member board that meets monthly. District provides burial services and maintains memorial grounds on the 6 acre site with 2 part-time employees and currently averages between 15-25 interments per year. The cemetery has estimated enough space for 15 interments per year for the next 150 years. Pine Grove Cemetery District also maintains Dana Cemetery (2 acres) located in the community of Dana 13 miles northwest of McArthur. The total area of the District is 142,074 acres bordering the Siskiyou County line to the north and crossing into Lassen County to the East and has a population estimated at 1,660 persons. The district began an endowment fund in 2016. The fiscal year 2016-17 budget is \$65,663.00.

## Fall River Mills Cemetery District -

Formation of Fall River Cemetery District was 1937. The District serves two cemeteries. Fall River Cemetery is located at 43331 Hwy 299 East in Fall River Mills, CA. The 3 acre site provides burial services and maintains grounds with one part time employee and averages 3-

6 interments per year. The cemetery is approximately half full with 718 plots available. A second 1.4 acre site called Winters Cemetery is located at 24742 Juniper Hill Drive within an area of the Fall River Golf Club. The site was deeded to the district in 1963 with a stipulation that there will be no new burials at that location. The total area of the district is 105,000 acres and has a population estimated at 814 persons. The endowment fund is \$21,714. The Fiscal Year 2016-17 fiscal budget is \$16,617.00.

## The Need for Combining the Two Districts

Fall River Cemetery District cannot fiscally continue operating their sites with the revenue they receive. This has been a problem for many years but it has become acute the past few years. Both districts rely heavily on property tax revenue with burial service fees providing a very small amount of revenue. Pine Grove Cemetery District receives substantially more tax revenue so it makes fiscal sense from the county's perspective to consolidate like districts into one district. It is a cost saving solution while maintaining the same level of service with minimal disruption to all concerned. The residents within the two districts they now have a choice of where to be buried without incurring non-resident burial fees.

## **Plan for Services**

This plan shall, at a minimum, respond to each of the following and be signed by the proponents of the change.

- 1. Level and range of consolidated cemetery services to be provided to the territory.
  - There will be one fulltime manager and one part time employee to service needs at cemetery locations.
  - *One phone number/email address will be maintained for merged district.*
  - The combined districts will be known as the Pine Grove Cemetery District.
  - All burial needs, and ground maintenance of facilities will be handled based on protocol of Pine Grove Cemetery policy and all equipment shared equally.
  - Prices will be the same at both cemeteries; and a resident of newly formed district may choose to be buried at location of choice.
- 2. Indicate when service would be extended to the territory.
  - Service would begin immediately upon Shasta LAFCo issuing a Certificate of Completion. It is hoped this can be done by July 1, 2017 as that is the beginning of the new fiscal year.
- 3. Identify any improvements, structures, other infrastructure, or other conditions the consolidated district would need to serve the territory.



## **INTRODUCTION**

This Municipal Service Review (MSR) and Sphere of Influence (SOI) Update provides information about the services and boundaries of Pine Grove Cemetery District resulting from the 2017 consolidation of the Pine Grove and Fall River Mills Cemetery Districts. The report is for use by the Shasta Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) in conducting a statutorily required process for setting the SOI for the consolidated district. The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 (CKH Act) requires that the Commission conduct periodic reviews and SOI updates of all cities and special districts in Shasta County (Government Code § 56425). State law also requires that, prior to SOI adoption, LAFCO must conduct a review of the municipal services provided by that local agency (Government Code §56430). This report provides LAFCO with a tool to study current and future public service conditions comprehensively and to evaluate organizational options for accommodating growth, preventing urban sprawl, and ensuring that critical services are provided efficiently.

## **Cemetery District Overview**

Cemetery Districts are independent special districts under Public Cemetery District Law (Government Code § 9000-9093). They provide, cemetery services to unincorporated areas. In Shasta County, they are governed by an independent Board of Directors. The District staff provides staff support and administers District operations.

The Public Cemetery District Law was established in 1909 by the California State Legislature. This legislation authorized public cemetery district creation, to assume burial grounds ownership and operation, and to provide interment services from fraternal, pioneer, religious, social and other organizations unable to maintain those cemeteries. Cemetery districts give communities the means to publicly finance cemetery operations, and to provide respectful and reasonably priced interment services, particularly in California's rural or semi-rural areas. Public cemeteries are among the earliest and oldest public facilities in California and did not exist before the 1909 public cemetery district law was enacted.

There are more than 200 public cemetery districts in California, including eight districts (seven after consolidation) in Shasta County. Statewide, the number of cemetery districts ranks fourth, behind water, fire and community services districts.

## **Principal Act**

Cemetery districts operate pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Division 8 specifically, the Public Cemetery District Law. The Pine Grove Cemetery District is governed by an elected, five-member board of trustees to fixed, four-year terms of office and is responsible for district operations.

Cemetery districts are independent special districts and are legally separate from the County. However, the County Board of Supervisors may assume responsibility of these districts if it is determined to be in the public interest.

## Service Review Determinations

Government Code § 56430 requires LAFCO to conduct a review of municipal services provided in the county by region, sub-region or other designated geographic area, as appropriate, for the service or services to be reviewed, and prepare a written statement of determinations with respect to each of the following topics:

- 1. Growth and population projections for the affected area;
- 2. The location and characteristics of any disadvantaged unincorporated communities within or contiguous to the sphere of influence;
- 3. Present and planned capacity of public facilities, adequacy of public services, and infrastructure needs or deficiencies (including needs or deficiencies related to sewers, municipal and industrial water, and structural fire protection in any disadvantaged, unincorporated communities within or contiguous to the sphere of influence);
- 4. Financial ability of agencies to provide services;
- 5. Status of, and opportunities for, shared facilities;
- 6. Accountability for community service needs, including governmental structure and operational efficiencies; and
- 7. Any other matter affecting or related to effective or efficient service delivery, as required by Commission policy.

State Guidelines and Commission policies encourage stakeholder cooperation in the municipal service review process. It also provides a basis to evaluate, and make changes to Spheres of Influence, if appropriate.

## **Sphere of Influence Determinations**

A SOI is a LAFCO-approved plan that designates an agency's probable physical boundary and service area. Spheres are planning tools used to provide guidance for individual boundary change proposals and are intended to encourage efficient provision of organized community services, discourage urban sprawl and premature conversion of agricultural and open space lands, and prevent overlapping jurisdictions and duplication of services.

LAFCO is required to establish SOIs for all local agencies and enact policies to promote the logical and orderly development of areas within the SOIs. Furthermore, LAFCO must update those SOIs every five years. For a SOI update, LAFCO is required to conduct a MSR and adopt related determinations. It must also make the following SOI determinations:

- 1. The present and planned land uses in the area, including agricultural and open-space lands;
- 2. The present and probable need for public facilities and services in the area;
- 3. The present capacity of public facilities and adequacy of public services that the agency provides or is authorized to provide;
- 4. The existence of any social or economic communities of interest in the area if the Commission determines that they are relevant to the agency; and

5. The present and probable need for public facilities and services related to sewers, municipal or industrial water, or structural fire protection of any disadvantaged unincorporated communities within the existing sphere of influence (effective July 1, 2012).

## **Review Methods**

The following information was considered in the development of this service review:

- o Agency-specific data: responses to LAFCO Requests for Information from Cemetery Districts;
- o Shasta County General Plan and Zoning data: Shasta County Planning Division GIS webpage;
- o Demographic data: U.S. Census Bureau; Department of Finance; CA Water Resources Board;
- o Finances: budgets, rates and fees; and
- o Other Reports: status of other districts in the east county area.

Information gathered was analyzed and applied to make the required determinations. All information gathered for this report is filed by LAFCO for future reference.

## California Environmental Quality Act

The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) is contained in Public Resources Code § 21000 et seq. Public agencies are required to evaluate the potential environmental effects of their actions. MSRs are statutorily exempt from CEQA pursuant to § 15262 (feasibility or planning studies) and categorically exempt pursuant to CEQA Guidelines § 15306 (information collection). CEQA requirements are applicable to SOI Updates. The CEQA lead agency for SOI Updates is most often LAFCO, unless an agency has initiated an SOI expansion or update.

## **District Overview**

Pine Grove Cemetery District is organized as an independent special district under Cemetery District law (Government Code Section 9000-9093). The Pine Grove Cemetery District provides burial services and memorial garden maintenance within its boundaries. There are four cemeteries within the PGCD, they are: Pine Grove Cemetery, Dana Cemetery, Fall River Cemetery, and Winters Cemetery.

## Formation

The Pine Grove Cemetery District was established on July 1, 2017 as a result a consolidation of two existing, adjacent cemetery districts. The original Pine Grove Cemetery District was formed in approximately 1886, however, documents pertaining to its formation were lost in a fire in the 1960s. The Fall River Mills Cemetery District was formed in 1937.

## Boundary and Sphere of Influence

The current service area of PGCD is approximately 255,466 acres (399 sq. miles). The northern border of the district is adjacent to Siskiyou and Modoc counties and the eastern border straddles the Lassen and Shasta County line, with 31, 204 acres of the district existing in northwest Lassen County. See Figure 1.

## **Governance Structure**

Pine Grove Cemetery District is governed by a five-member Board of Trustees. Candidates for the Board of Trustees are interviewed and voted on by a district board and the selected name goes to Shasta County Board of Supervisors for approval.



## Management and Staffing

Level and range of consolidated cemetery services to be provided to the territory.

- one part time manager and one part time employee to service needs at cemetery locations.
- One phone number/email address will be maintained for merged district.
- The combined districts will be known as the Pine Grove Cemetery District.
- All burial needs, and ground maintenance of facilities will be handled based on protocol of Pine Grove Cemetery policy and all equipment shared equally.
- Prices will be the same at both cemeteries; and a resident of newly formed district may choose to be buried at location of choice.



**Other Service Providers** 

Fire District

Fire protection and emergency response services are provided to the consolidated District by County Service Area #1 - Shasta County Fire Department (SCFD), the McArthur Fire Protection District, and Fall River Mills Fire Protection District.

## Community Service District

The Cemetery District is in the Fall River Valley CSD, which provides potable water services.

## Resource Conservation District

PGCD is in the Fall River RCD which supports private and public landowners in the use and management of natural resources.

## Present and Planned Land Uses

## **Existing Land Uses**

The existing land uses in the district are primarily agriculture with areas of open space dispersed along the edges. There are several small communities located along Hwy 299, the main transportation artery to the area. There is one irrigation reservoir that provides water to the district.

## General Plan, Zoning, and Policies

Pine Grove Cemetery District is located within the unincorporated area of the county and is therefore subject to the Shasta County General Plan and Zoning Regulations. The current land use designations in the district are primarily a mix of Agricultural, Open Space, Commercial, Industrial, Limited Residential and Rural Residential.

## **Future Development Potential**

The primary infrastructure needed for public cemetery districts is sufficient land available for cemetery purposes. Interment capacities vary according to the way the land is developed. If more niches are purchased, more capacity can generally be developed than if only plots are purchased. The decision as to the mix of plots and niches depends on burial practices. As the districts has interment capacity for many years, there are no plans purchase additional land.

## Population and Growth

Based on United States Census Bureau 2010 census blocks and geospatial analysis, the estimated population for PGCD is 2,474. Future population estimates show growth in the unincorporated areas of Shasta County to be negligible. A 2016 DOF report notes a recent decrease of 0.5 percent in the County's unincorporated population between 2015 and 2016, indicating a future potential for population loss in unincorporated areas including PGCD. However, population estimates for the county still predict an increase of between zero and 0.5 percent through 2035.3 Using the 0.5 percent annual growth estimate and the 2010 population, the PGCD population could increase to 2,802 by the year 2035.

## Disadvantaged Unincorporated Communities

LAFCO is required to evaluate water service, sewer service, and structural fire protection within disadvantaged unincorporated communities as part of this service review, including the location and characteristics of any such communities. A disadvantaged unincorporated community (DUC) is defined as any area with 12 or more registered voters where the annual median household income (MHI) is less than 80 percent of the statewide annual (MHI) (pursuant to Government

Code Section 56033.5 and Water Code Section 79505.5). The MHI, as reported by the United States Census is \$61,818. Within a DUC, three basic services are evaluated: water, sewage, and fire protection. PGCD does not provide these services — domestic water is provided by either the Fall River Valley CSD or private wells. Wastewater service is not provided by a local service provider, the community relies upon individual private septic tanks for sewage disposal. As mentioned above, CSA #1, McArthur Fire Protection District, and Fall River Mills Fire Protection District provide fire protection for PGCD.

Pine Grove Cemetery District is located in Shasta County Community Tracts 06089012701 and 06089012702. Both of which meet the definition of a Disadvantaged Community Tract. The combined average MHI for the Tracts is \$39,519, 64 percent of the state average, thereby qualifying the area as disadvantaged. Should territory in the surrounding area be evaluated for annexation in the future, disadvantaged communities in the area should be further considered.

## District Service and Infrastructure

The Pine Grove Cemetery Districts provides burial services and memorial garden maintenance within its boundaries. There are four cemeteries within the PGCD, they are: Pine Grove Cemetery, Dana Cemetery, Fall River Cemetery, and Winters Cemetery. In total, the cemeteries accommodate approximately 18-31 interments per year, with the exception of Winters Cemetery, which has not provided new burial services as per a deed stipulation, since 1963. Pine Grove has an estimated capacity of 15 burials per year for the next 150 years, and the Fall River Mills has approximately 359 open plots which results in a capacity of approximately 6 burials per year for 59 years. Cremation is more commonly accepted today. If this trend continues, interment capacity for remaining land may be much higher than it is in older sections.

## **Financing Constraints and Opportunities**

The primary revenue sources are service fees and a share of the 1% property tax. Cemetery service fees come from plot sales, required endowment funds contributions, sale of vaults and liners, and interment (opening and closing graves).

As a cemetery becomes full, the income from service fees declines, which can be a significant financial constraint as maintenance costs must be covered by property taxes and the endowment fund. This emphasizes the importance of carefully evaluating the fees charged for services, particularly the endowment fund fees.

## **Cost Avoidance Opportunities**

Economies of scale in most organizations -- particularly small public entities -- are most readily apparent in management and administrative functions, where the marginal costs of adding additional responsibilities are not high. Most other economy of scale savings would arise from being able to afford specialized equipment to increase labor productivity. Capital factors involved in cemetery operations are typically not major. However, from a management and administrative perspective, these small cemetery operations are ideal candidates for the consolidation of managerial and administrative functions.

## MUNICIPAL SERVICE REVIEW DETERMINATIONS

This section addresses determinations as specified in the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 (California Government Code § 56430). As part of the municipal service review process, LAFCO makes the following written determinations.

Pine Grove Cemetery District is located in Shasta County Community Tracts 06089012701 and 06089012702. Both of which meet the definition of a Disadvantaged Community Tract. The Tracts have a combined average MHI of \$39,519, which is 64 percent of the state average MHI, thereby qualifying the area as disadvantaged.

Present and planned capacity of public facilities, adequacy of public services, and infrastructure needs or deficiencies including needs or deficiencies related to sewers, municipal and industrial water, and structural fire protection in any disadvantage unincorporated communities within or contiguous to the sphere of influence.

Current capacity of public facilities is determined to be sufficient at this time.

## Financial ability of agencies to provide services

The cemetery district provides burial and memorial garden maintenance to the 4 cemeteries within the district. It is determined that PGCD is financially able to adequately provide these services.

## Status of, and opportunities for, shared facilities

No opportunities for shared facilities have been identified. There is no known overlapping or duplication of services within the Cemetery Districts boundaries.

Accountability for community service needs, including governmental structure and operational efficiencies

PGCD is governed by a five-member Board of Trustees. Meetings are held the second Wednesday of the month and are open to the public. PGCD demonstrated accountability and transparency by disclosing financial and service related information in response to LAFCO requests.

Any other matter related to effective or efficient service delivery, as required by commission policy None beyond those listed above.

## SPHERE OF INFLUENCE DETERMINATIONS

Shasta LAFCO makes the following written SOI determinations.

The present and planned land uses in the area, including agricultural and open-space lands.

The existing land uses in the district are primarily agriculture with areas of open space dispersed along the edges. There are several small communities located along Hwy 299, the main transportation artery to the area. There is one irrigation reservoir that provides water to the district.

The present and probable need for public facilities and services in the area.

The primary infrastructure needed for public cemetery districts is sufficient land available for cemetery purposes. As the district has interment capacity for many years, there are no plans to purchase additional land.

The present capacity of public facilities and adequacy of public services that the agency provides or is authorized to provide.

Pine Grove has an estimated capacity of 15 burials per year for the next 150 years, and the Fall River Mills has approximately 359 open plots which results in a capacity of approximately 6 burials per year for 59 years. Cremation is more commonly accepted today. If this trend continues, interment capacity for remaining land may be much higher than it is in older sections. The present capacity of public facilities provided by the City appear to be adequate to serve current demand.

The existence of any social or economic communities of interest in the area if the commission determines that they are relevant to the agency.

The Fall River Valley provides for the daily local needs of the population within PGCD. The Cities of Anderson and Redding are approximately 70 miles away. They provide a major shopping and service industry hub for local residents in Shasta County.

For an update of a sphere of influence of a city or special district that provides public facilities or services related to sewers, municipal and industrial water, or structural fire protection, the present

and probable need for those public facilities and services of any disadvantaged unincorporated communities within the existing sphere.

Communities located within PGCD and SOI are considered to be disadvantage unincorporated communities. There are no DUCs that should be considered for inclusion in the SOI.

## **Shasta Local Agency Formation Commission**

A Resolution Making Determinations and Approving the Consolidation of the Pine Grove and Fall River Mills Cemetery District, the dissolution of the Fall River Mills Cemetery District and a Sphere of Influence Update for the consolidated district

WHEREAS, Concurrent Resolutions of Applications from the Pine Grove Cemetery District and Fall River Mills District for consolidation into the Pine Grove Cemetery District, as defined in the California Health and Safety Code Division 8 Section 9000 – 9093, Public Cemetery District Law, has been filed with the Executive Officer of the Shasta Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) and said application complied with all the requirements of law and the Commission; and.

WHEREAS, The Pine Grove and Fall River Mills Cemetery Districts both circulated notices to agencies and interested parties including LAFCO and have adopted a notice of intention to adopt a resolution initiating LAFCO proceedings and have conducted public meetings based on their notification, and have received and considered comments presented at the public hearings; and

WHEREAS, the proceedings for the district consolidation (dissolution and formation) are governed by the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 as amended, Section 56000 et seq. of the Government Code; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Fall River Mills Cemetery District and the Pine Grove Cemetery District that the territory currently served and within these two districts be included into the consolidated Pine Grove Cemetery District; and

WHEREAS, at the time and in the manner provided by law, the Executive Officer issued a certificate of filing which gave notice of the date, time, and place of a public hearing by the Commission upon said application; and

WHEREAS, the Shasta Local Agency Formation Commission has adopted a new Sphere of Influence for the consolidated Pine Grove Cemetery District; and

WHEREAS ,the Executive Officer has reviewed the application and has prepared a report including staff recommendations thereon within the time required by law and has furnished copies of said report to the Commission and to all other persons required by law to receive it; and

WHEREAS, at a hearing on June 1, 2017, the Commission considered the proposal and the report of the Executive Officer; the factors determined by the Commission to be relevant to this proposal, including, but not limited to, factors specified in Government Code Section 56668, and all other relevant evidence and information presented at said hearing, including the comments of all interested parties desiring to be heard; and

WHEREAS, LAFCO, on behalf of the two districts, prepared and certified as the Lead Agency a Notice of Exemption for the affected territory pursuant to the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (Section 21000 et seq. of the Public Resources Code).

## NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, DETERMINED AND ORDERED by the Shasta Local Agency Formation Commission as follows:

The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

- 1. The territory comprises approximately 255,466 acres more or less and is inhabited.
- 2. The change of organization is assigned the following distinctive short-term designation: Pine Grove Cemetery District Formation.

- 3. The Commission has reviewed and considered the information contained in the Notice of Exemption prepared for the Pine Grove Cemetery District for this change of organization and makes a specific determination that this environmental determination adequately addresses this change of organization. The Commission hereby affirms and incorporates by reference the decision as part of the findings for this resolution.
- 4. The Commission adopts and affirms the Notice of Exemption prepared by Shasta LAFCO and directs the Executive Officer to file a Notice of Exemption as provided under the California Environmental Quality Act. Applicant shall be responsible for payment of any documentary handling fees required by the Shasta County Clerk or filing office.
- 5. The proposed Pine Grove Cemetery District is consistent with and coterminous with the existing Districts and does not conflict with any other agency providing similar services.
- 6. The Commission adopts the determinations regarding consistency with LAFCO policies contained in the staff report for this project and incorporates them by reference herein.
- 7. The Fall River Mills Cemetery District and the Pine Grove Cemetery District formed pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Division 8 Section 9000 et. seq. are hereby consolidated and the successor district shall be the Pine Grove Cemetery District.
- 8. This change of organization includes all the territory shown in Exhibit "A" Consolidated Pine Grove Cemetery District. The boundaries of the district, as set forth in the proposal, are hereby approved as shown in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and by this reference incorporated herein.
- 9. The effective date of formation shall be upon the recordation of the Certificate of Completion and after the completion of all proceedings.
- 10. The Pine Grove Cemetery District shall be the successor agency to all rights, responsibilities, properties, contracts, assets and liabilities, and functions of the Pine Grove Cemetery District and the Fall River Mills Cemetery District. Any professional service agreements and individual employments contracts will be evaluated consistent with the provisions as follows:
- 11. Any full-time or part-time employees of the Pine Grove Cemetery District and the Fall River Mills District shall become full-time or part-time employees of the successor agency. Contract employees and professional service agreements will be evaluated, at the sole and exclusive discretion of the governing body of the consolidated Pine Grove Cemetery District, to determine whether they are essential to the ongoing operation of the District.
- 12. The successor agency shall function under and carry out all authorized duties and responsibilities assigned to Fall River Mills District as outlined in Public Cemetery District Law and other applicable laws.
- 13. As applicable, all income from taxes, assessments or any other source, which has been a continuing right to tax distribution, or historical distribution or allocation of funds to each of the Districts, shall continue to be distributed to the Pine Grove Cemetery District.
- 14. The provisional appropriation limit of the Pine Grove Cemetery District shall be set in the amount as determined by the Shasta LAFCO for the first full fiscal year. This amount is to be set from the proceeds of taxes currently received by the Pine Grove Cemetery District and the Fall River Mills District. As stated in Government Code section 56811, the permanent appropriations limit of the district shall be set at the first district election that is held following the first full fiscal year of operation.
- 15. All Assets, unrestricted, restricted or fiduciary, held by the Fall River Mills Cemetery District, shall be transferred to and become assets of the Pine Grove Cemetery District. The consolidated District shall be the successor agencies to both Districts. The assets

- include, but are not limited to vehicles, the watering system, office equipment, maintenance equipment and cash assets.
- 16. Any previously authorized charges, fees, assessments, and/or taxes currently in effect, now levied or collected by each district, including improvement or assessment districts thereof, shall continue to be levied and collected by the successor Pine Grove Cemetery District.
- 17. All liabilities of the Districts shall be transferred to and become liabilities of the consolidated Pine Grove Cemetery District.
- 18. Reorganization of these two (2) districts shall not change the rights of the lands in the respective district as they existed immediately prior to the consolidation.
- 19. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code Sections 9020 et. seq. the Board of Trustees for the Consolidated Pine Grove Cemetery District shall be five (5) members and all Directors shall be elected to serve four-year terms and all directors shall be residents within the Pine Grove Cemetery District Boundaries.
- 20. The district shall provide the range of services authorized by the Cemetery District Law, commencing at Section 9040 et. seq. of the California Health and Safety Code. The Board of Trustees of the Pine Grove Cemetery District shall authorize an annual work plan for services throughout the consolidated District.
- 21. The Sphere of Influence adopted by Shasta LAFCO (Resolution 2017-21) on June 1, 2017 shall guide the Pine Grove Cemetery District and any Sphere of Influence Updates shall be required per Government Code 56425 (g).
- 22. LAFCO is the conducting authority for this consolidation. In accordance with the provisions of Government Code Section 56000 et.seq. and Shasta LAFCO Policies, if the Commission does not receive written protests prior to the close of the public hearing on June 1, 2017, the protest-hearing requirement pursuant to Government Code Section 57000 et seq. shall be waived and the change of organization is ordered complete. If written protests are received at the public hearing, the proposal shall be subject to protest proceeding thresholds in Government Code Section 57077.2. As necessary the Commission hereby directs the Executive Officer to schedule a protest hearing for this matter after the expiration of the reconsideration period specified by Section 56895; to conduct the hearing for this reorganization; and, upon completion of the hearing, to take action as appropriate in accordance with LAFCO Policies and the requirements.
- 23. All exhibit maps, and electronic copies shall be submitted to LAFCO prior to the recordation of the Certificate of Completion.
- 24. Approval of this consolidation (reorganization) is conditioned upon the applicant's obligation to defend, indemnify, and hold harmless the Shasta Local Agency Formation Commission and its agents, officers and employees from any claim, action or proceeding against the Commission or its agents, officers, and employees; including all costs, attorney's fees, expenses and liabilities incurred in the defense of such claim, action, or proceeding to attack, set aside, or void the approval or determinations of this Commission concerning this annexation. Shasta LAFCO shall promptly notify the applicant of any such claim, action, or proceeding and be entitled to representation by counsel of its choosing.
- 25. Unless otherwise waived, all LAFCO, Shasta County and State of California fees must be paid in full prior to Certificate of Completion filing. LAFCO will forward invoices and (or) a list of estimated required fees or deposits to the agency prior to Certificate of Completion filina.
- 26. The Executive Officer is hereby directed to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to each affected agency, as provided in G.C. Section 56882.

- 27. The Executive Officer is directed to record a Certificate of Completion for this proposal upon completion of all proceedings.
- 28. Completion of proceedings shall be concluded within one year after adoption of this resolution. If the proceedings are not concluded within one year after passage of this resolution, all proceedings shall be terminated unless an extension is approved.
